

Functional Description

The CY7C9925 RoboClock is 200-MHz Low-voltage Programmable Skew Clock Buffer that offers user-selectable control over system clock functions. This multiple-output clock driver provides the system integrator with functions necessary to optimize the timing of high-performance computer systems. Eight individual drivers, arranged as four pairs of user-controllable outputs, can each drive terminated transmission lines with impedances as low as 50Ω while delivering minimal and specified output skews and full-swing logic levels (LVTTTL).

Each output can be hardwired to one of nine delay or function configurations. Delay increments of 0.32 to 1.6 ns are determined by the operating frequency with outputs able to skew up to ± 6 time units from their nominal "zero" skew position. The completely integrated PLL allows external load and transmission line delay effects to be canceled. When this "zero delay" capability of the LVPSCB is combined with the selectable output skew functions, the user can create output-to-output delays of up to ± 12 time units.

Divide-by-two and divide-by-four output functions are provided for additional flexibility in designing complex clock systems. When combined with the internal PLL, these divide functions allow distribution of a low-frequency clock that can be multiplied by two or four at the clock destination. This facility minimizes clock distribution difficulty while allowing maximum system clock speed and flexibility.

Block Diagram Description
Phase Frequency Detector and Filter

These two blocks accept inputs from the Reference Frequency (REF) input and the Feedback (FB) input and generate correction information to control the frequency of the Voltage-Controlled Oscillator (VCO). These blocks, along with the VCO, form a Phase-Locked Loop (PLL) that tracks the incoming REF signal.

VCO and Time Unit Generator

The VCO accepts analog control inputs from the PLL filter block and generates a frequency that is used by the time unit generator to create discrete time units that are selected in the skew select matrix. The operational range of the VCO is determined by the FS control pin. The time unit (t_U) is determined by the operating frequency of the device and the level of the FS pin as shown in *Table 1*.

Notes:

- For all three-state inputs, HIGH indicates a connection to V_{CC} , LOW indicates a connection to GND, and MID indicates an open connection. Internal termination circuitry holds an unconnected input to $V_{CC}/2$.
- The level to be set on FS is determined by the "normal" operating frequency (f_{NOM}) of the VCO and Time Unit Generator (see Logic Block Diagram). Nominal frequency (f_{NOM}) always appears at 1Q0 and the other outputs when they are operated in their undivided modes (see *Table 2*). The frequency appearing at the REF and FB inputs will be f_{NOM} when the output connected to FB is undivided. The frequency of the REF and FB inputs will be $f_{NOM}/2$ or $f_{NOM}/4$ when the part is configured for a frequency multiplication by using a divided output as the FB input.



Skew Select Matrix

The skew select matrix is comprised of four independent sections. Each section has two low-skew, high-fanout drivers ($xQ0$, $xQ1$), and two corresponding three-level function select ($xF0$, $xF1$) inputs. *Table 2* below shows the nine possible output functions for each section as determined by the function select inputs. All times are measured with respect to the REF input assuming that the output connected to the FB input has $0t_U$ selected.

Test Mode

The TEST input is a three-level input. In normal system operation, this pin is connected to ground, allowing the CY7C9925 to operate as explained briefly above (for testing purposes, any of the three-level inputs can have a removable jumper to ground, or be tied LOW through a 100Ω resistor. This will allow an external tester to change the state of these pins.) If the TEST input is forced to its MID or HIGH state, the

device will operate with its internal phase locked loop disconnected, and input levels supplied to REF will directly control all outputs. Relative output to output functions are the same as in normal mode.

In contrast with normal operation (TEST tied LOW). All outputs will function based only on the connection of their own function select inputs (xF0 and xF1) and the waveform characteristics of the REF input.


Operational Mode Descriptions


Figure 2. Zero-Skew and/or Zero-Delay Clock Driver

Figure 2 shows the LVPSCB configured as a zero-skew clock buffer. In this mode the CY7C9925 can be used as the basis for a low-skew clock distribution tree. When all of the function select inputs (xF0, xF1) are left open, the outputs are aligned and may each drive a terminated transmission line to an independent load. The FB input can be tied to any output in

this configuration and the operating frequency range is selected with the FS pin. The low-skew specification, coupled with the ability to drive terminated transmission lines (with impedances as low as 50Ω), allows efficient printed circuit board design.




Figure 3. Programmable-Skew Clock Driver

Figure 3 shows a configuration to equalize skew between metal traces of different lengths. In addition to low skew between outputs, the LVPSCB can be programmed to stagger the timing of its outputs. The four groups of output pairs can

each be programmed to different output timing. Skew timing can be adjusted over a wide range in small increments with the appropriate strapping of the function select pins. In this configuration the 4Q0 output is fed back to FB and configured for

zero skew. The other three pairs of outputs are programmed to yield different skews relative to the feedback. By advancing the clock signal on the longer traces or retarding the clock signal on shorter traces, all loads can receive the clock pulse at the same time.

In this illustration the FB input is connected to an output with 0-ns skew (x_{F1} , $x_{F0} = \text{MID}$) selected. The internal PLL synchronizes the FB and REF inputs and aligns their rising edges to insure that all outputs have precise phase alignment.

Clock skews can be advanced by ± 6 time units (t_{U}) when using an output selected for zero skew as the feedback. A wider range of delays is possible if the output connected to FB is also skewed. Since "Zero Skew", $+t_{U}$, and $-t_{U}$ are defined relative to output groups, and since the PLL aligns the rising edges of REF and FB, it is possible to create wider output skews by proper selection of the x_{Fn} inputs. For example a $+10 t_{U}$ between REF and $3Q_x$ can be achieved by connecting $1Q_0$ to FB and setting $1F_0 = 1F_1 = \text{GND}$, $3F_0 = \text{MID}$, and $3F_1 = \text{High}$. (Since FB aligns at $-4 t_{U}$ and $3Q_x$ skews to $+6 t_{U}$, a total of $+10 t_{U}$ skew is realized.) Many other configurations can be realized by skewing both the output used as the FB input and skewing the other outputs.




Figure 4. Inverted Output Connections

Figure 4 shows an example of the invert function of the LVPSCB. In this example the $4Q_0$ output used as the FB input is programmed for invert ($4F_0 = 4F_1 = \text{HIGH}$) while the other three pairs of outputs are programmed for zero skew. When $4F_0$ and $4F_1$ are tied HIGH, $4Q_0$ and $4Q_1$ become inverted zero phase outputs. The PLL aligns the rising edge of the FB input with the rising edge of the REF. This causes the $1Q$, $2Q$, and $3Q$ outputs to become the "inverted" outputs with respect to the REF input. By selecting which output is connect to FB, it is possible to have 2 inverted and 6 non-inverted outputs or 6 inverted and 2 non-inverted outputs. The correct configuration would be determined by the need for more (or fewer) inverted outputs. $1Q$, $2Q$, and $3Q$ outputs can also be skewed to compensate for varying trace delays independent of inversion on $4Q$.




Figure 5. Frequency Multiplier with Skew Connections

Figure 5 illustrates the LVPSCB configured as a clock multiplier. The $3Q_0$ output is programmed to divide by four and is fed back to FB. This causes the PLL to increase its frequency until the $3Q_0$ and $3Q_1$ outputs are locked at 20 MHz while the $1Q_x$ and $2Q_x$ outputs run at 80 MHz. The $4Q_0$ and $4Q_1$ outputs are programmed to divide by two, which results in a 40-MHz waveform at these outputs. Note that the 20- and 40-MHz clocks fall simultaneously and are out of phase on their rising edge. This will allow the designer to use the rising edges of the $1/2$ frequency and $1/4$ frequency outputs without concern for rising-edge skew. The $2Q_0$, $2Q_1$, $1Q_0$, and $1Q_1$ outputs run at 80 MHz and are skewed by programming their select inputs accordingly. Note that the FS pin is wired for 80-MHz operation because that is the frequency of the fastest output.




Figure 6. Frequency Divider Connections

Figure 6 demonstrates the LVPSCB in a clock divider application. $2Q_0$ is fed back to the FB input and programmed for zero skew. $3Q_x$ is programmed to divide by four. $4Q_x$ is programmed to divide by two. Note that the falling edges of the $4Q_x$ and $3Q_x$ outputs are aligned. This allows use of the rising edges of the $1/2$ frequency and $1/4$ frequency without concern for skew mismatch. The $1Q_x$ outputs are programmed to zero skew and are aligned with the $2Q_x$ outputs. In this example, the FS input is grounded to configure the device in the 15- to

30-MHz range since the highest frequency output is running at 20 MHz.




Figure 7. Multi-Function Clock Driver

Figure 7 shows some of the functions that are selectable on the 3Qx and 4Qx outputs. These include inverted outputs and outputs that offer divide-by-2 and divide-by-4 timing. An inverted output allows the system designer to clock different subsystems on opposite edges, without suffering from the pulse asymmetry typical of non-ideal loading. This function allows the two subsystems to each be clocked 180 degrees out of phase, but still to be aligned within the skew spec.

The divided outputs offer a zero-delay divider for portions of the system that need the clock to be divided by either two or four, and still remain within a narrow skew of the "1X" clock.

Without this feature, an external divider would need to be added, and the propagation delay of the divider would add to the skew between the different clock signals.

These divided outputs, coupled with the Phase Locked Loop, allow the LVPSCB to multiply the clock rate at the REF input by either two or four. This mode will enable the designer to distribute a low-frequency clock between various portions of the system, and then locally multiply the clock rate to a more suitable frequency, while still maintaining the low-skew characteristics of the clock driver. The LVPSCB can perform all of the functions described above at the same time. It can multiply by two and four or divide by two (and four) at the same time that it is shifting its outputs over a wide range or maintaining zero skew between selected outputs.




Figure 8. Board-to-Board Clock Distribution

Figure 8 shows the CY7C9925 connected in series to construct a zero-skew clock distribution tree between boards. Delays of the downstream clock buffers can be programmed to compensate for the wire length (i.e., select negative skew equal to the wire delay) necessary to connect them to the

master clock source, approximating a zero-delay clock tree. Cascaded clock buffers will accumulate low-frequency jitter because of the non-ideal filtering characteristics of the PLL filter. It is recommended that not more than two clock buffers be connected in series.
